Employee Volunteers

Federal and state wage and hour laws require employers to compensate employees for their work. Sounds pretty basic, right? This can get confusing, however, when hourly employees "volunteer" their time. For example, what if the association maintenance man "volunteers" to stay late to finish repairs? What if the association administrative assistant "volunteers" to attend an association holiday event, perhaps to take tickets or pass out food? Are these hourly employees really volunteering their time or are they working?

The Supreme Court says a "volunteer" is someone who:

- Without promise or expectation of compensation,
- But solely for his personal purpose or pleasure,
- Works in the activities carried on by another person,
- For their own pleasure or profit.

More on the Impact of Auditor Independence Rules on Management Company Accounting

At the heart of this issue is the fact that the HOA industry, as it has operated for many years, has generally not understood or recognized the difference between audit/review services and other accounting services. To put this into the framework recognized by the AICPA:

- Audit and review services are "attest" services, because the <u>independent</u> CPA is "attesting" to work performed by his client (the association).
- Making a cash-to-accrual conversion, making year-end tax accrual, preparing income tax returns, and "preparing financial statements" (the act of adding footnotes, a cash flow statement, and reserve disclosures to management-prepared financial statements) are all considered "non-attest" services, because the CPA is involved in the act of creating information, not attesting to what another person has done. These are considered management functions.

Performance of these "non-attest" services is considered to impair the independence of the CPA because they are management functions. The proposed rules shift the burden of performing these services back to the association / management company.
